

Jewish Population in the United States, 1992

BASED ON LOCAL COMMUNITY counts—the method for identifying and enumerating Jewish population that serves as the basis of this report—the estimated size of the American Jewish community in 1992 was 5.8 million. This is about 5 percent more than the 5.5 million “core” Jewish population estimated in the Council of Jewish Federations’ 1990 National Jewish Population Survey (NJPS).¹

The difference, small though it is, between the national and aggregated local figures is probably explained by the lag in data gathering and reporting on the local level, as well as definitional problems. As more local communities conduct studies over the next few years, declines and increases that have already occurred will be documented, and the updated statistics will show national and regional patterns more in line with NJPS findings. Based upon trends revealed in NJPS data, declines can be expected to be reported in Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, and most of the Midwestern states. Higher community totals are anticipated for Colorado, Arizona, and the Pacific Northwest.

The NJPS used a scientifically selected sample to project a total number for the United States, but could not provide accurate information on the state and local levels. Therefore, as in past years, in this article we have based local, state, and regional population figures on the usual estimating procedures.

While the Jewish federations are the chief reporting bodies, their service areas vary in size and may represent several towns, one county, or an aggregate of several counties. In some cases we have subdivided federation areas to reflect the more natural geographic boundaries. Some estimates, from areas without federations, have been provided by local rabbis and other informed Jewish community leaders. In still other cases, the figures that have been updated are from past estimates provided by United Jewish Appeal field representatives. Finally, for smaller communities where no recent estimates are available, figures are based on extrapolation from older data. The estimates are for the resident Jewish population, including those in private households and in institutional settings. Non-Jewish family members have been excluded from the total.

The state and regional totals shown in Appendix tables 1 and 2 are derived by summing the individual estimates shown in table 3 and then making three adjustments. First, communities of less than 100 are added. Second, duplicated counts within states are eliminated. Third, communities whose population resides in two or more states (e.g., Kansas City and Greater Washington, D.C.) are distributed accordingly.

Because population estimating is not an exact science, the reader should be aware that in cases where a figure differs from last year's, the increase or decrease did not come about suddenly but occurred over a period of time and has just now been substantiated. Similarly, the results of a completed local demographic study often change the previously reported Jewish population figure. This should be understood as either an updated calculation of gradual demographic change or a correction of a faulty older estimate.

In determining Jewish population, communities count both affiliated and nonaffiliated residents who are "core" Jews as defined in NJPS.² In most cases, counts are made by households, with that number multiplied by the average number of self-defined Jewish persons per household. Similarly to NJPS, most communities also include those born and raised as Jews but who at present consider themselves as having no religion. As stated above, non-Jews living in Jewish households, primarily the non-Jewish spouses and non-Jewish children, are not included in the 1992 estimates presented in the appendix below.

Local Population Changes

Nine communities reported increases of greater than 1,000 this year. The community reporting the largest numeric increase was that of the suburban Cherry Hill-Southern New Jersey area, which includes Camden, Burlington, and Gloucester counties. The new population figure of 49,000, which results from a recently completed Jewish population study, is nearly double the old estimate of 26,000.

Only one other community reported a Jewish population increase of more than 10,000—the Chicago metropolitan area. A new study in Chicago showed a Jewish population of 261,000, up 13,000 from the previous estimate of 248,000 in a similar study a decade ago. While the geographic area covered in the new study is larger than that in the previous study, other factors in this modest increase of about 5 percent are an influx of immigrants from the former Soviet Union and in-migration from smaller Midwestern communities.

Three of the seven other communities with Jewish population increases of greater than 1,000 were in Florida: Sarasota, Naples-Collier County, and Ft. Myers-Lee County. Sarasota's increase is based upon a recently completed demographic study; in Naples, a recently established Jewish federation was able to identify many new as well as previously unknown Jewish households. The other four communities with large increases were Raleigh, North Carolina; Somerset County, New Jersey; Norfolk-Virginia Beach, Virginia; and St. Paul, Minnesota. In the latter, a recently completed demographic study found a larger Jewish population than previously believed.

The remaining communities with significant increases in Jewish population were

primarily in the South and in the West. These include Prescott, Arizona; Fresno, Monterey, Riverside, Salinas, and San Bernardino, California; Key West, Gainesville, Ocala, Tampa, and Tallahassee, Florida; Savannah, Georgia; Frederick and Harford counties, Maryland; Las Vegas, Nevada; Eugene, Medford, and Salem, Oregon; Greenville, South Carolina; Knoxville, Tennessee; Lubbock, Texas; Salt Lake City, Utah; Fredricksburg, Virginia; and Bellingham, Olympia, and Tri-Cities, Washington. Other places with significant increases outside of the South and West are New Milford, Connecticut; Greenfield, Massachusetts; Hoboken, New Jersey; Ithaca, New York; Rochester, Minnesota; Bennington, Vermont; and Appleton, Wisconsin. Finally, there are three communities listed for the first time: Redwood Valley and South Lake Tahoe, California; and Manchester, Vermont.

No community reported a significant loss of Jewish population. However, continuing the trend of recent years, the largest declines were reported in the Northeast, Midwest, and interior South. In the Northeast, Jewish population dropped in New Haven and Stamford, Connecticut; Buffalo, New York; and Passaic, Bergen, and Northern Hudson counties in New Jersey. The Bergen and Passaic losses reflect the decline in the Jewish population reported by the North Jersey Jewish Federation, which serves portions of these two counties. Other smaller losses in the Northeast were in Colchester, Connecticut; Augusta and Bangor, Maine; Amsterdam and Binghamton, New York; and Chambersburg, Pennsylvania. Losses were reported in the Midwest and interior South in Joliet, Illinois; Fort Wayne, Indiana; Alexandria and Lake Charles, Louisiana; Jackson, Michigan; Greenville and Jackson, Mississippi; Lincoln, Nebraska; and Toledo and Lima, Ohio. Decreases in other parts of the country were reported in Albany, Georgia; Stockton and Tulare-Kings counties, California; and Waco, Texas. In California, the reduction in the Orange County figure is based upon a reevaluation of the community lists.
